

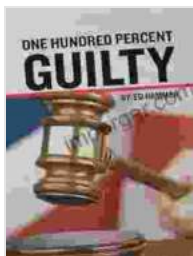
One Hundred Percent Guilty: The Chilling True Crime Case of Solomon Barroa

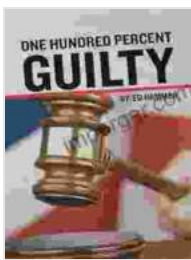

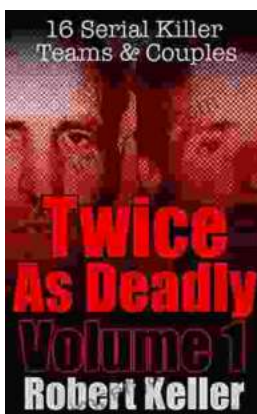
